GIVING FROM A HAND THAT RECEIVETH

Simba reDzidzo beneficiaries are socially active individuals who serve the community in more ways than one. Through their individual community projects, each beneficiary impacts their communities in different ways. However, one beneficiary, Mufaro Shumbayaonda, a 3rd year Speech Therapy student at the University of Zimbabwe stands out. Mufaro had a vision to contribute to community in a bigger way. She saw the benefit in numbers, and how Simba reDzidzo scholarship beneficiaries could get together as a group to extend their receiving hands to others. The idea of a group community project was conceived and a team of beneficiaries was put in place to spearhead the project. The team, led by Mufaro and Simon Marumbe, a 4th year medical student, identified a community home, Tariro House of Hope, as needing assistance with basic food and household commodities to support orphans and vulnerable children living in the high-density and low socioeconomic area of Epworth in Harare. Tariro House of Hope, like Simba reDzidzo, are on a mission to alleviate poverty in low socioeconomic communities.

Mufaro and her team organised scholarship beneficiaries together and each made a small contribution to the project. To supplement the donations, a fundraising project, in the form of a Speech Contest was initiated. Participants to the speech contest were required to pay an entry fee to the competition. The speech contest had two levels of competition, with speech writing in the first round, and winners from that round proceeding to do an oral presentation of their speech in the final round. After committed advertising by each beneficiary we were proud to recruit forty-seven participants in the first round. 12 participants made it through to the final stage where the top 3 winners stood a chance to win admission into Simba reDzidzo Toastmasters Club. Runners-up would receive educational hampers.

The first ever Simba reDzidzo Speech Contest took place on the 29th of October 2022. The event was successful, with a great turn up from the contestants and the Simba reDzidzo family. Many thanks to the Community project committee and Simba reDzidzo family for contributing to the success of the speech contest. After the contest Mufaro remarked, "The excitement and anxiety coupled with the hard work my team and I put into the project gave us great satisfaction when the contest succeeded. On the day, we were coming from weeks of busy days and sleepless nights, cranking our heads to get ideas on what we could do or change for the event to be successful. I was relieved and happy that I had organized such a big and quality event, for the first time!". Simon added, "the whole process of organising the group Community Project and Speech Contest was a great learning experience. We learnt leadership, negotiating and organisational skills. I am grateful to Simba reDzidzo for giving us the opportunity to grow as individuals. I feel empowered!"

The culmination of these fundraising activities was a day spent by Simba reDzidzo scholarship beneficiaries interacting with vulnerable children who are under the care of Tariro House of Hope. The day was filled with festivities. We cooked, ate and played games. We shared our own stories of struggle with the children. Then Mufaro presented our group donation of groceries, stationery and sanitary pads to the children of Tariro House of Hope. Seeing the smiles on their faces was heart-warming. That we had given hope (Tariro in Shona) to these children was the most gratifying experience for each one of us.

GIVING HOPE TO VULNERABLE CHILDREN

On Saturday 10 December 2022, Simba reDzidzo beneficiaries visited Tariro House of Hope to give a donation of basic goods. After the handover, I caught up with Rutendo Maswera, social worker and administrator of Tariro House of Hope.

Mufaro: Who is Tariro House of Hope?

Rutendo: Tariro House of Hope is an activity center in Epworth founded in 2007 by Mrs Regina Dururu-Okorafo a former Zimbabwean police officer. Its mission to alleviate poverty and suffering by providing relief and support to orphans and vulnerable children. Our infrastructure is not large enough to house children, so we assist them from their respective homes under four programs. Normally, the children report to THH daily, but during school terms, with the disparities in school timetables, they come only on Saturdays.

Mufaro: Who are your beneficiaries and how do you select them? Rutendo: Orphaned children and any other vulnerable children. There isn't a specific selection of children, some just walk in the community center with their concerns and we follow up to check authenticity of their stories. Others are referred from the community, churches, schools and community clinics.

Mufaro: What programs do you offer to support your beneficiaries? Rutendo: We offer four programs namely, Education, Feeding and Hamper, Free-to-Reign, and Sponsor-a-child program. We currently have 60 children under the education program where the children receive tuition fees, uniforms and stationery to attend local primary and secondary schools. The children also benefit from tutoring and mentorship provided by College Interns as well as volunteers who come on weekends. We also offer vocational skills training including Cosmetology, Driving and Interior designing, through our partners. The Feeding and Food hamper program provides one free meal daily for its 46 beneficiaries. In addition, food hampers are distributed to the most vulnerable children of THH families. The Free-to-reign program was started to empower girls with freedom to reign, free to live with dignity, free to live healthy lives and excel. We provide sanitary pads to 18 students enrolled under the program. The Sponsor a child program is an extension of the Education Program. About 18 children have external sponsors or co-sponsors. Sponsors are individuals or organizations who

Mufaro: How do you think Simba reDzidzo and Tariro House of Hope can collaborate to reduce poverty in our communities?


have applied to sponsor a child.








THE GOOD "DOCTOR"

Simba reDzidzo is on a quest to groom young leaders who are passionate about bringing change in their communities. This year has been exceptionally great for Simon Marumbe, a 4th year medical student at the University of Zimbabwe who through his great leadership attributes, recently got accepted into the Millennium Fellowship program. Simon was appointed Campus Director for United Nations Academic Impact(UNAI) and Millennium Campus Network Fellowship for his university. Millennium Campus Network (MCN) is a global student network advancing the United Nations Sustainable Goals. "My role as the Campus Director entails facilitating learning sessions for my campus Fellows, as well as being their communication link with the UNAI and Millennium Fellowship coordinators", explains Simon. "I ensure that my campus fellows receive all the help they need in their journeys of making a social impact through the United Nations Sustainable development goals".

Simon describes his experience as civic learning, meaning that it's a process through which young people develop knowledge, skills and community commitments. "My experience with MCN is great. I enjoy sessions on how to interact with the community in a way that makes positive social impact. Interacting with world renowned leaders and influential people like Professor M. Yunus from Shanghai, who started the global club 3Zero, is amazing. In this journey I have opportunities to meet great people who are changing lives on a global scale, and that is the best experience for me".

Explaining how he became a Millennium Fellow, Simon said, "At Simba reDzidzo we are required to undertake community projects as a way of teaching us responsible citizenship. My involvement in the community enabled me to get into MCN".

Simon went on to describe how his community project ignited an interest in the specialty of public health medicine. "I ran a Hypertension Awareness Campaign in Zengeza where I live, and with mentorship from Dr Chitsunge I was able to convert this into a research project. These are the things that make me happy, I feel satisfied and I am grateful to Simba reDzidzo". He also highlighted that without Simba reDzidzo, his chances of getting into MCN were very slim and he applauded the organization for its mentorship program. His words of advice to other young people were, "If you identify a problem, don't start by tackling the big challenges, start by solving small problems. For example if you identify a drug abuse issue in your community, start small by talking directly to your peer about the hazards of drug abuse, your peer will hopefully educate the next person and so on. So basically, you can start with smallest problems and advance with time, definitely you'll make an impact in your community."

INTERVIEW WITH THE SPEECH CONTEST WINNER, DALITSO NDLOVU

Congratulations on winning the speech contest. How does it feel? Dalitso Ndlovu: It feels good, but I also take it up as a challenge to put my skills to the test. Now that I've won, I'm sure people will be keeping an eye on me to see what moves I make next, so they better be good enough to justify my achievement. So a combination of excitement and pressure!

What was your strategy in winning this contest?

Dalitso Ndlovu: I always say "preparation is 70% of the task. Execution is 30%. Luck is simply a matter of when opportunity meets preparation." I constantly practiced the speech on my own as if I was already in the room, so when I was in the room it was simply a matter of going through the phases.

Did you learn anything about yourself during the whole process of the speech contest?

Dalitso Ndlovu: Yes, I learned that I may perhaps be more influential than I often give myself credit for. Naturally, I'm someone who prefers working from behind the scenes, but perhaps there is a leader in me that also needs to be more on the frontline moving forward.

Did the contest live up to your expectations? What was your best moment?

Dalitso Ndlovu: It did, and I am hoping that it was the beginning of a very prolific journey in Toastmasters for me and the rest of the team. My best moment was during my speech, when I glanced around the audience and suddenly noticed that everyone was keenly paying attention to what I was saying. Their facial expression represented deep focus to the extent that it almost frightened me a little.

Can you give us a brief background about yourself? What are you studying, what are your career plans?

Dalitso Ndlovu: I'm currently studying a degree in Information Systems, which is a field which looks into Software Engineering and Business Management. I hope to specialize in Data Analytics and Business Intelligence once I am done, and I am also an Online Forex Trader. So basically Tech and Finance/Investments.

How do you think being a member of Simba reDzidzo Toastmasters Club will impact you?

Dalitso Ndlovu: I think it will give me the platform to reach out to more people, and also enhance my leadership skills so that many of the ideas I have can be shared with people willing to cooperate in engineering success.

Any words of advice to those wishing to take part in next year's Simba reDzidzo's speech contest?

We met Dr M Kwaramba when she visited Zimbabwe in August 2022. The meeting was captivating and a life changing experience. All the beneficiaries were excited to meet with the Vice-President of Simba reDzidzo Board. The level of excitement was so high that beneficiaries residing out of Harare travelled to town for this encounter. Of-course, there was also the food element to it! We were all looking forward to be in the presence of someone who has achieved so much in academia, and has travelled the world.



Dr Marcia, as we affectionately address her, explained how she started her journey at Africa University in Zimbabwe, where she completed her undergraduate degree in Agriculture. Upon graduation, she joined Agribank and worked in the Loan and Finance department for 3 years. A friend in Taiwan told her about scholarships for study at a Business School in Taiwan. "I was young and adventurous, and my friend assured me that the Business School was on a drive to recruit international students as part of meeting their accreditation standards. Trish Tanaka Macharavanda known amongst scholarship beneficiaries as an inspirational speaker, is a 1st year pharmacy student at the University of Zimbabwe. In this article, Trish tells how her life transformed because of Simba reDzidzo. "Here I am!", she begins. "I was humbled from the day I entered into this world. I was not born in a hospital or a clinic like most of you did, I had to be taken to a clinic after my birth. Being born into a poor rural background gave me motivation to become someone recognizable in the community. Growing up I was only concerned about my health but with time, I realised that I needed to expand my thinking. I became concerned about the health of everyone around me. I realised that there was no pharmacy in my village, and people travelled long distances to buy medicines. That's when I decided to become a pharmacist. Yes, this was a dream and it's still a dream but I can feel that there is light at the end of the tunnel".

"Although I was raised from a poor rural background, I never doubted my abilities. I am grateful that I was able to go to school despite the struggle that my family had in raising my tuition fees. I chose to study sciences in line with my goal of being a pharmacist. With so much hard work and determination I passed my Ordinary Level with flying colours. This gave me some confidence to pursue my dream. Although I knew that raising tuition fees was a huge burden to my parents, I proceeded to apply to study pharmacy at the University of Zimbabwe. I also applied for many University scholarships and luck was on my side. I was accepted into Simba reDzidzo Scholarship program."

"It's now almost 3 months since I became a beneficiary of Simba reDzidzo Scholarship but it seems like I have been for a decade. Transition from high school to university has not been hard because of the mentorship program. I was registered into Simba reDzidzo Toastmasters Club where I am gaining communication and life skills. I receive a monthly stipend to cater for my communication and data needs. I had no learning device and Simba reDzidzo provided me with a laptop which has made my academic life easier. Simba reDzidzo is like my family, I will forever be grateful for their commitment to break the cycle of poverty and empower young people".

MORE THAN A MENTOR

WHAT IS SUCCESS AFTER-ALL?

Two years ago, if I were to be asked what the ingredients for success were, I would answer like this, "Education, because it is the key to freedom, the passport to success, the inheritance of no stress, the pillar of a kingdom, an assurance of a better future and something to make me relevant in life". But is it enough? Are we taught the right principles of success in school? Does it mean that because I have a degree, I am successful? I think for you to understand my point of view, you need to read through and understand me more.

When I got a place to study Medicine and Surgery, I could see that my parents were relieved. They were so confident that my future was bright and I was hopefully, going to break the cycle of poverty in our family. The excitement increased when I got a scholarship, such that the whole community was told. I didn't want to disappoint anyone, so I committed to my academics. During my studies, I was able to see how some doctors lived after university. To my surprise, not all of them were successful the way I thought they would be. One of the doctors, who later passed on, was a drug addict. I was shocked, and confused at the same time. I was in confusion because I did not know what my fate was going to be like. But during the course of my studies, I came across two medical doctors who have made a positive impact to my life. They are not only educated, but they are amongst men and women of character, matchless integrity, dogged determination and believers and doers of welfare works. These medical doctors founded Simba reDzidzo (The Power of Education). They gave me hope and lessons, that intelligence is not enough, and that there was more to it than just being educated.

Simba reDzidzo has taken a number of mentorship initiatives including team building activities, formation of a Toastmasters Club, as well as the privilege of access to powerful mentors, all in an effort to empower us.
